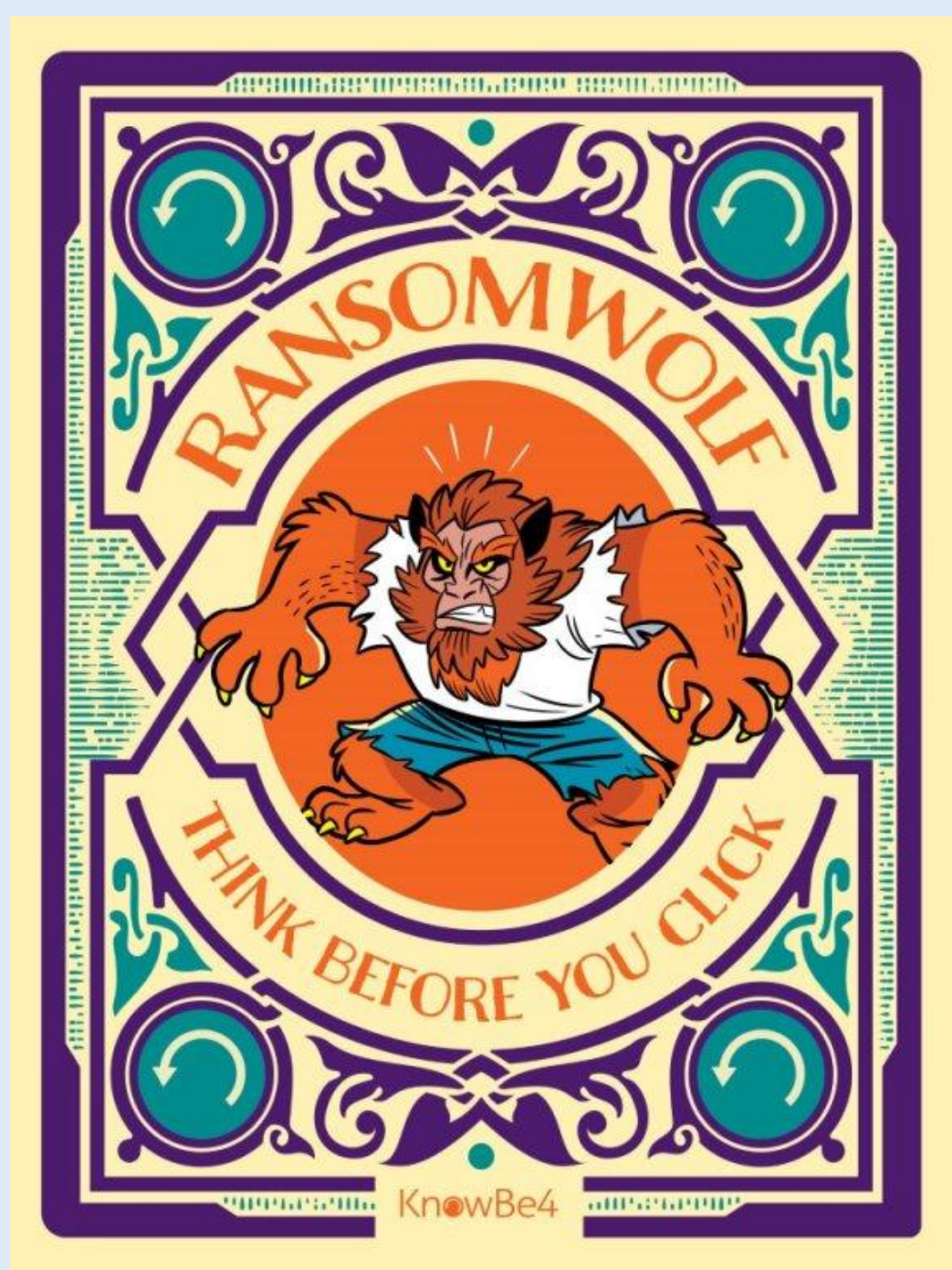
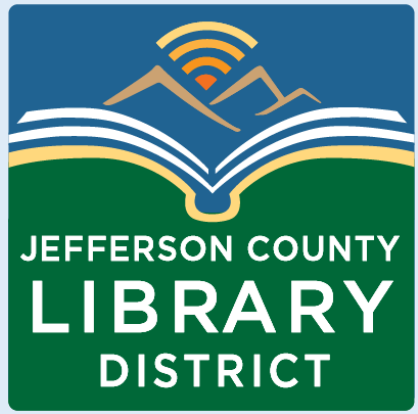

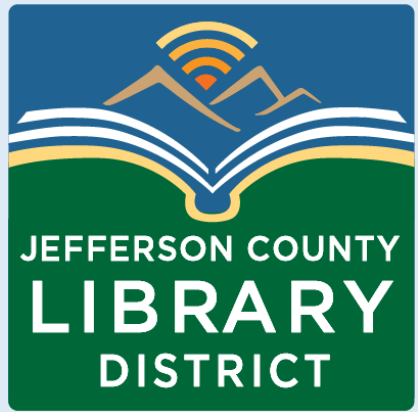

Why backup your data?



Ransomware is a type of malware that can cause your files to become "locked" until a ransom is paid.

Having a backup copy of your data is one form of protection from ransomware.



RANSOMWOLF

Lurking in that innocent-looking file attachment you just downloaded, Ransomwolf is ready to gobble up all your important files, bounding from folder to folder through the forest of your network. Unlike other werewolves, Ransomwolf is invulnerable to "silver bullets." Organizations need both regular backups and a well-trained employee base to keep this monster at bay. Don't wait until this monster turns into something worse!

Preferred Targets: Education, Infrastructure, Healthcare

Weaknesses: Well-informed users, regular backups, dog biscuits

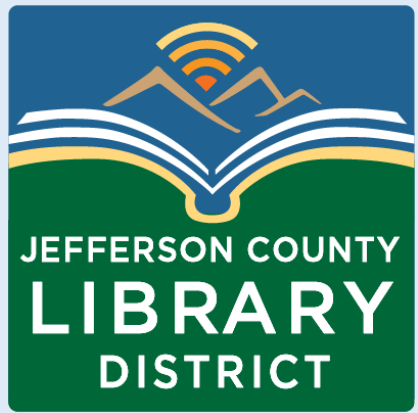


Vocabulary

Cloud storage - allows users to save data and files in an off-site location that accessible via the public internet or a dedicated private network connection.

External Drive – most commonly applies to storage devices external to a personal computer. Examples include external hard drives and USB or flash drives.

Local drive - a hard drive or SSD (solid-state drive) that is installed inside of or connected to your computer.

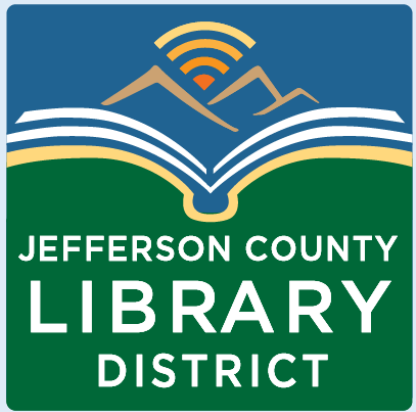

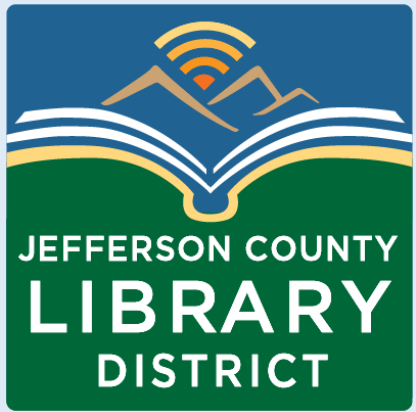

What data do you control?

Much of what we do online no longer stores data just on our machine.

For example, if you are active on social media you don't usually back up your social media site. You depend on Facebook, X, Instagram, etc. to backup your data.

Your email through Google, Yahoo, Microsoft or others is often not stored completely on your device. The data is stored on the Company's servers.



Backing up data

A simple way to secure data valuable to you is to make backup copies.

This could be to an external device such as an external hard drive, USB drive, or cloud storage.





3-2-1: Backup Strategy

1. Maintain **three** copies of data—the original, and at least two copies.

Example – a backup copy on your device (local), one on cloud storage, and one on an external drive.

2. Use **two** different media types for storage. This can help reduce any impact that may be attributable to one specific storage media type.

Example – a backup copy in OneDrive (cloud storage) and one on your computer.

3. Keep **one** copy offsite to prevent the possibility of data loss due to a site-specific failure.

Example - an external hard drive or cloud storage.

Microsoft Windows – File History

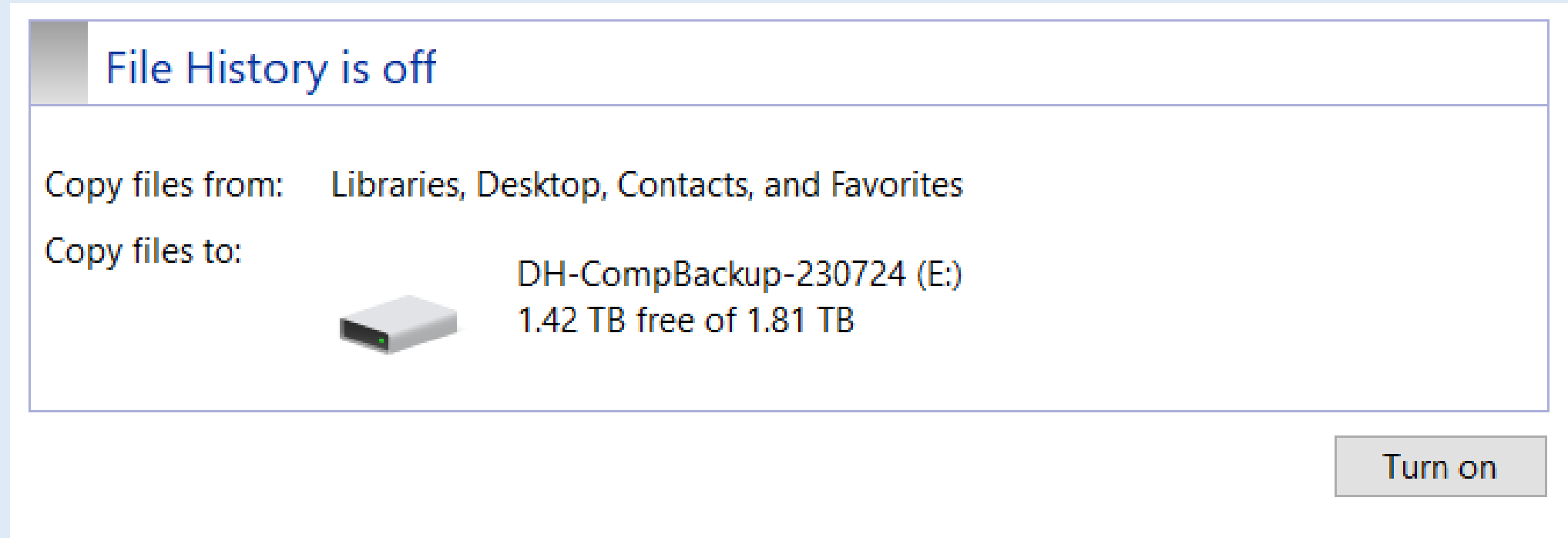
Apple Mac – Time Machine

Android / Google Cloud – App data, Call history, Contacts, Settings, SMS messages, Pictures and videos, MMS messages

Apple / iCloud – Photos, Videos, App Data, SMS and MMS Messages

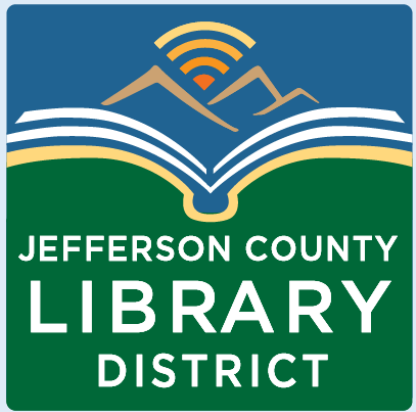


Windows File History



File History allows you to recover a previous version of a file should it go missing or become unusable.

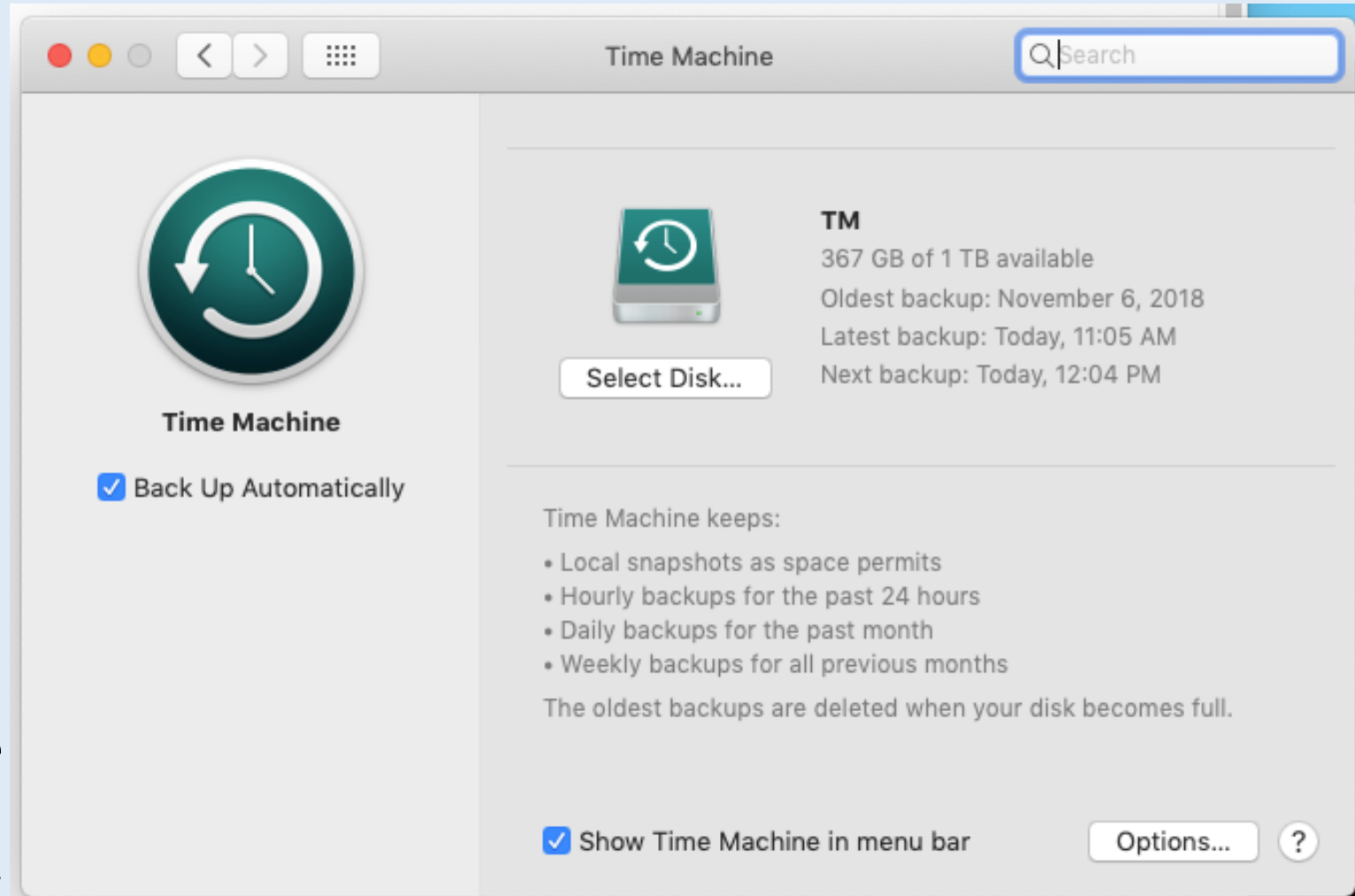
To enable **File History** use the Search tool  and enter **File History**.

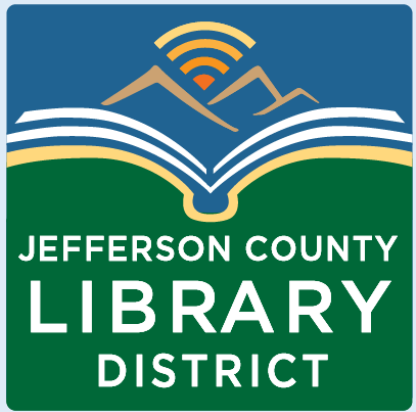


Mac Time Machine

How to enable Time Machine backups on your Mac

1. Select **System Preferences** from the Apple menu.
2. Choose the **Time Machine** icon.
3. Click **Select Backup Disk**.
4. Select which disk you'd like to use as a Time Machine backup. ...
5. Check the **Back Up Automatically** box in order to automatically back up.

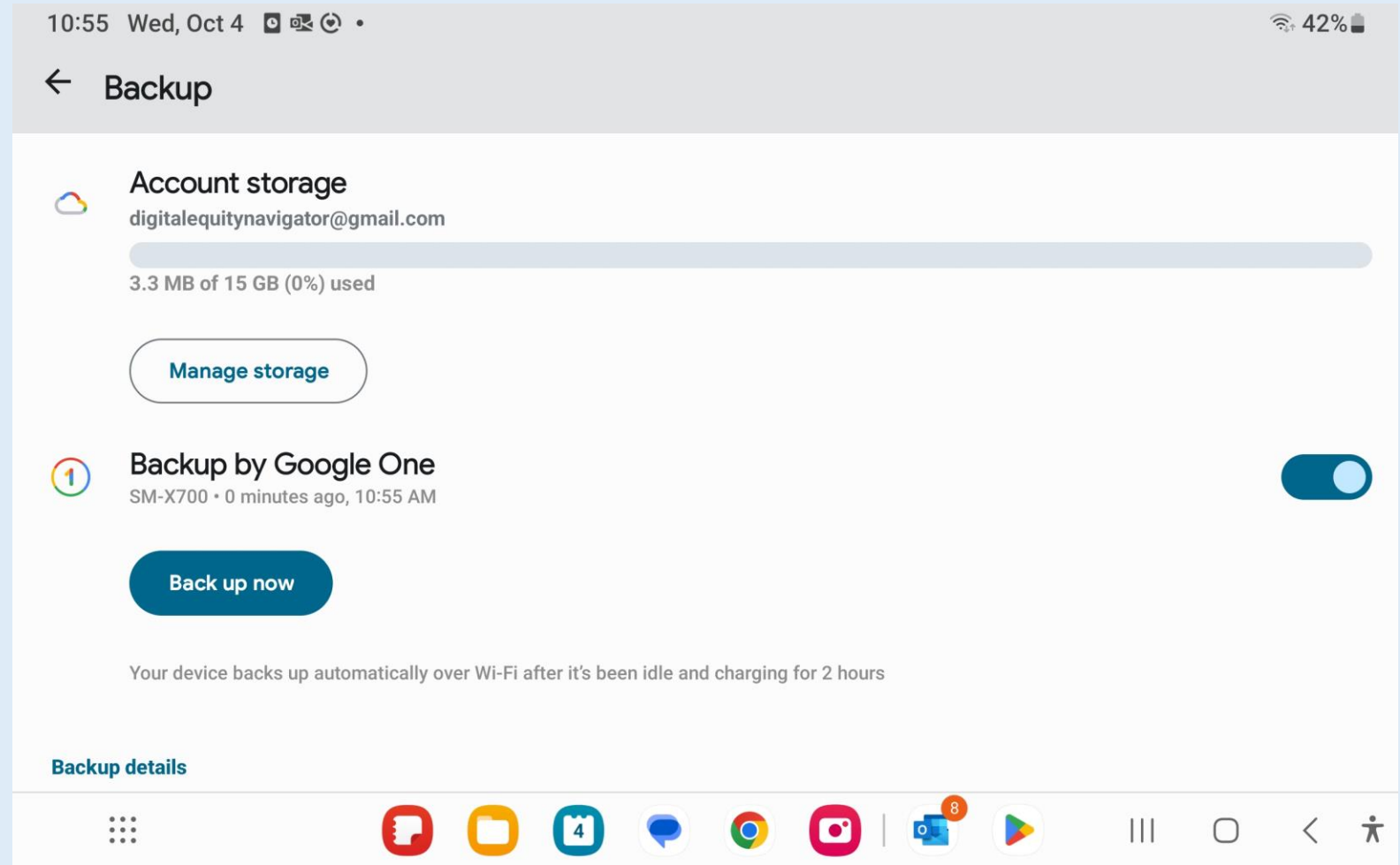




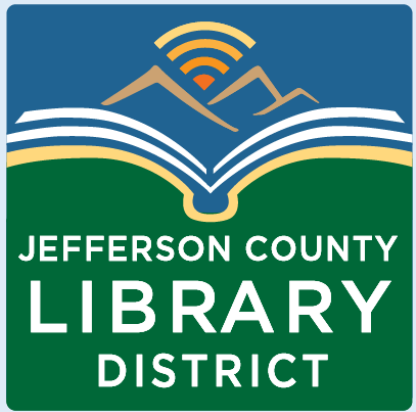

Settings – Google - Backup



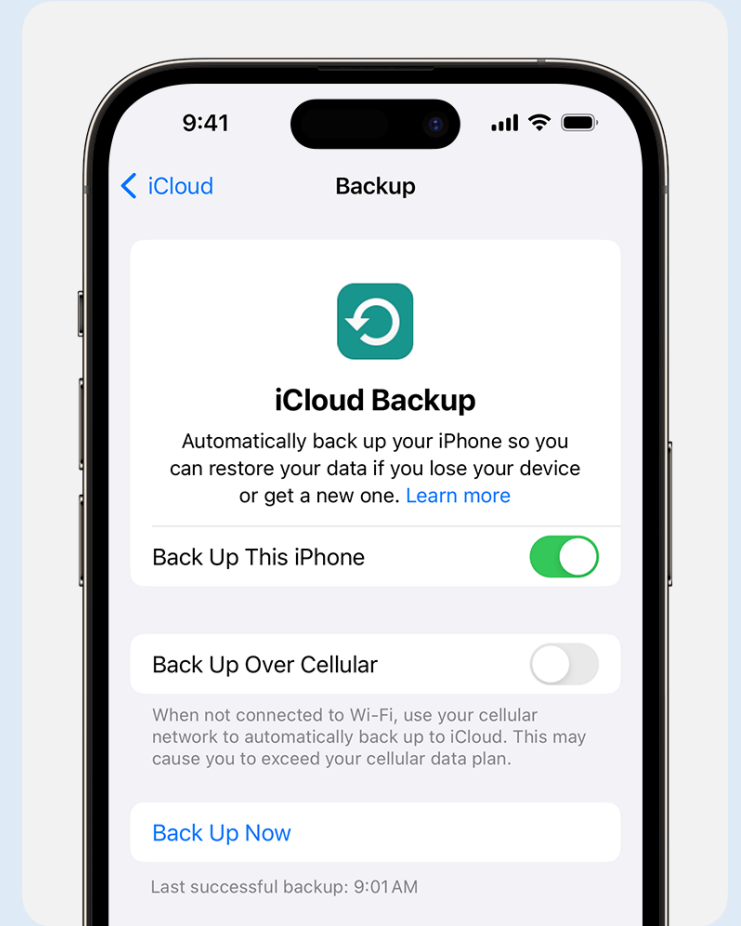
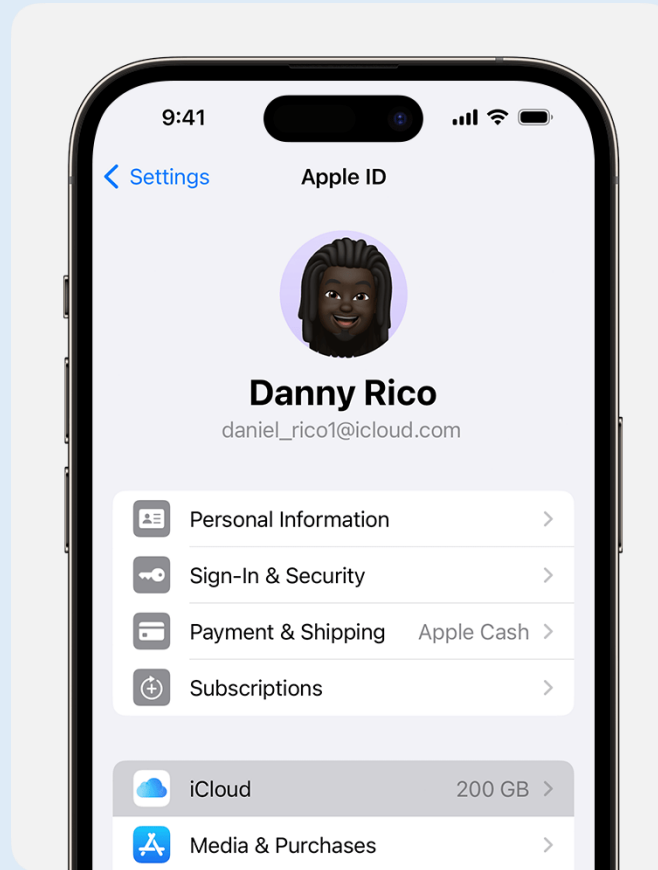
